# ROOS A.F.C. **ROOS WIN THE CUP!**

On 11th May, on a truly historic and memorable Sunday morning, Roos 'A' pulled off a magnificent victory over a good young Dulverton side to lift the Sunday League's Hostick Cup at Booth-

ferry Park, the home of Hull City.

To add to the sense of occasion, the whole squad plus all invited guests for the Directors' Box travelled together in a speciallyhired coach. On arrival, the team squad was allowed to make a pre-match pitch inspection a la Wembley. The general opinion was that the pitch was not as good as it used to be but everything else about the ground fulfilled all expectations - a perfect setting for a Cup Final.

As Dave Hampton and Paul McKinley had both reported fit, after more than a week's intensive treatment for injuries received

Roos kicked off and immediately put the opposition defence under pressure. However, the Dulverton defenders didn't intend taking any prisoners and their tackling in the early stages was particularly fierce, causing the first of a series of injuries to the Roos players. Leb Battye received a knock on his ankle and had to be taken off. After sustained treatment he came back on, only to break down again a few minutes later. Much to his disappointment, he had to be substituted by Dave Iley after only 20 minutes.

For the remainder of the half both defences were on top and only an occasional scoring chance was created. From one of these Pete Dearing pulled off a fine full-stretch save and at the other

end Dave Iley shot wide when well placed.

As the first period drew to a close, Roos were obviously gaining the ascendancy and were starting to put together some good quality football. However, Mark Nesti was struggling at half pace, having also suffered an ankle injury, and things didn't look too good for him. At the half-time whistle the game was scoreless

The second half continued in much the same way as the first, with the Roos back four - Blenkin, Hodgson, Bailey and Atkins dealing more than capably with anything that Dulverton could

However, half way through, with Mark Nesti and now Paul McKinley also restricted by injuries, I was ready to replace one of them with our second substitute, Des Beeston, when Roos suffered another blow. Dave Hampton's pulled hamstring let him down and he could no longer continue. So Des came on to take his place in central midfield and this proved to be the turningpoint of the match for us

The game was approaching the final quarter now and - just as we were dreading the possibility of extra time because of all our injuries - the match suddenly exploded into life. Making a brilliant last-ditch attempt to block a shot from Dulverton's best forward, Stu Blenkin handled the ball and Dulverton were awarded a penalty. Their skipper took the kick and buried the ball in the net, having sent Pete Dearing the wrong way. Score: 0-1.

This reversal, however, proved to be the spur that we needed. Roos scored immediately from the kick-off. Apart from some altercations with Paul McKinley that mystified us spectators, the referee had had a good game. He now spotted an off-the-ball foul just outside the Dulverton penalty area. Des Beeston took the free kick quickly, chipping over the wall of defenders into the space in the penalty area. The keeper looked to have the ball covered but, happily for us, he allowed it to slip through his legs and there was Dave Iley to crash it into the net, 1-1

The game was now alight and Roos were roaring. Within a few minutes they scored a magnificent goal. In the Roos six-yard box a Dulverton move broke down on the rock of Chris Hodgson, who was excellent throughout the game. He played a good ball to Paul McKinley on the edge of the centre circle. Paul played it square to Dave Cowell who passed it down the right wing to Nick Derbyshire. Nick brilliantly turned his defender and placed a great ball in front of Dave Iley who raced into the penalty area, passed heavy-legged Dulverton defenders, and placed a perfect cross for a grateful Des Beeston to slide into the net. 2-1 to Roos.

The crowd of Roos supporters - who were magnificent throughout - now really had something to cheer about. And cheer they

did: they knew there was only one winner now.

A minute later the game was over. But before that, the deadly combination of our two substitutes - Des Beeston and Dave Iley sealed the victory for us. Des won the ball in a tackle in the centre circle, looked up, and immediately hit a thirty-yard through ball into the path of Dave who - in spite of the goalkeeper and two defenders converging on him - won the chase for the ball, rounded the keeper, and pushed the ball into the empty net. Thus, within less than ten minutes, Roos had come from the depths of despair to magnificent euphoria. The final whistle blew with Roos still on the attack

Dave Iley deservedly won the man of the match award but everyone in the side played superbly, especially the defenders, who were brilliant throughout the game. Special mention must also be given to Des Beeston who scored one goal, had a hand in both the others and was tremendous from the moment he came

After the match, tea and sandwiches were served for players and guests in the Hull City boardroom, which completed an exceptionally memorable Sunday morning for everyone lucky enough to be there. I should like to convey my thanks to Les Wilkinson, who made a video film of the match which we replayed in The Black Horse on Sunday evening. This was a fantastic experience for the players, seeing themselves on TV for the first time, and the cheers when the goals were scored could be heard at the Post Office, I am told.

This victory more than made up for the disappointment when the team failed to win the Division 10 League title. They lost 3-2 against a 'National' team illegally reinforced by outside players. Although Roos had most of the play, National defended extremely well and with the aid of some fine goal-keeping, more than a few goal-line clearances, and the woodwork, they managed to hold on for victory. This was the first defeat Roos had suffered for ten matches, having won all the previous nine, and the double was definitely on the cards. But we will settle for what we got, completing a tremendously successful season by finishing second in the League - and, of course, winning the Cup.

A very enjoyable presentation evening was held on 16th May at The Mermaid, Tunstall. A well-organised raffle raised £101.39 for the club. Awards for the season went to the following players:

#### ROOS VILLAGE APPRAISAL

Presentation of Report

The results of the Questionnaire circulated within the village were presented at a meeting in the Memorial Institute on Monday, 19th May. Draft copies of the Report had previously been available in local shops and blown-up

pages of it were mounted as a display.

Mr. Willis Ainley acted as Chairman on behalf of the Appraisal Group and gave a special welcome to Charlotte Hursey, Rural Officer of the Community Council of Humberside. Miss Hursey later presented a cheque from the Community Council in support of the Appraisal. Five members of Roos Parish Council were present and some of them participated in subsequent discussion of the Report.



A review of the initiation of the Appraisal Questionnaire and the stages of its distribution and processing was given by Mr. Leslie Helliwell.

Charlotte Hursey spoke of the value of Village Appraisals, drawing both on her own experience and on that of groups throughout the country. She stressed that inmost instances an initial questionnaire had been invaluable but had usually proved to be only a starting-point. Almost always the facts derived from a questionnaire had suggested further positive action by both voluntary groups and by local councils. Sometimes a second questionnaire, perhaps several years later, had provided evidence of advances achieved in a particular community during the intervening period.

The presentation of the grant from the Community Council followed. It was received on behalf of the Appraisal Group by Mr. Alan Bowden. Chairman Willis Ainley pointed out that the main use of the grant would be to help meet the costs of producing copies of the Report in bulk. Copies would be provided for the Borough Council, the Parish Council and other official bodies. It was also assumed that individuals might wish to have their own copies.

General discussion followed, during which particular

parts of the Report were considered. The Chairman said that the Appraisal Group would meet once or twice more in order to finalise production of the Report copies. Thereafter, the Group as at present constituted might cease to exist - or, if there were interest from other bodies in the village, it might be enlarged to provide wider representation with a view to further action.

(A Summary of the Questionnaire Report was printed in the May issue of 'The Rooster'. Unfortunately there were three typing errors:

In Paragraph 1, italicised, lines 4 and 5 should have read: "the figures could be doubled..."

In the first column, under "CONSERVATION & EN-VIRONMENT", in Paragraph 4, line 6, delete the last word - "said".

In the first column, under "SERVICES: Possible Speed Restriction", lines 1 and 2 should have read: "80% wanted a speed restriction, 28 people wanted the whole village to be included".)

It was agreed to pay the subscription (£68.60) to the Association of Parish Councils but to ask for an explanation of the 20% increase. The Parish Council Accounts were approved prior to the Annual Audit by the Borough Council.

# Monthly Meeting

The A.G.M. was followed by the normal monthly meeting. The Minutes of the meeting of 14th April were approved. In answer to a query from Councillor Quarmby, the Parish Clerk, Mr. Cyril Woodhouse, said that there had been no further information about Roos Beck.

# Correspondence

The Borough Council had sent leaflets explaining the bye-laws that concerned straw-burning in Holderness and other leaflets (published by the Department of Trade and Industry) concerning advice and help for small businesses. The County Council had sent information about bus passes and had provided booklets for parents about various aspects of the education service.

A leaflet from the Department of Trade and Industry described grants available from the European Regional Development Fund to help areas - including the Hull area - affected by job losses in the fishing industry. Entitled "Grants from Europe for Small Firms", the leaflet gave details of the kinds of grant available and the address to which applications should be made. Copies of this and the other leaflets referred to are held by the Parish Clerk.

A letter had been received from Mr. Houlton, of the Area Surveyor's Office, Hedon. On behalf of Humberside Technical Services, he wrote that, following an inspection of Rectory Road, it had been decided that a road sign would be inappropriate: a 'Bend' sign would only distract drivers.

The Borough Solicitor had referred to the Parish Council two applications for a Public Entertainment Licence. They were from Mrs. M.E. Smith, The Elms, Roos, in respect of a Midsummer Dance on 19th July in aid of All Saints', Roos, and from Mr. K.G. Grant, Elms Farm, in respect of a Barn Dance on 27th June organised by the Roos Playing Field Committee. The Parish Council raised no objection.

#### **Planning and Accounts**

The application by Mr. A. Shaw for an extension to the rear of Corner House, Main Street, Roos, had previously been refused by the Borough Council (as the Parish Council learned at their October meeting - see 'The Rooster', November 1985). It was now reported that the matter was to go appeal.

Borough Council approval had been given to two applications: by Mr. K.G. Grant in respect of Mount Farm, Hilston, and by Mr. M. Grant in respect of Elms Farm, Roos; both were for a change of use of a former coaching house to residential ac-

commodation.

There were no accounts to be considered at this meeting.

#### **Any Other Business**

The School Clock. In answer to a question, Councillor Cheeseman said that there was nothing further to report from Mr. Crook.

Public Seats. Councillor Priest asked if there had been any progress in relation to the seats offered by two separate donors. The Parish Clerk said that he had spoken to a representative of one of the prospective donors but he would write again to both parties

Grass Verges. Councillor Cheeseman asked if anything could be done to stop horses from churning up the verges on the road to North End and to prevent cars from parking on the verges. Roos Young Farmers had planted bulbs which had had no chance of developing. It was suggested that a letter be sent to the Highways Department.

# 7th May v Withernsea

This fast and attractive game was the best possible advertisement for Rugby League football. Withernsea opened the scoring with a Dave Wilson penalty goal after fifteen minutes, followed minutes later by a Warren Graham touch-down in the corner. Although Withernsea were at this stage clearly the better side, Roos never gave in and much credit must go to the pack, and especially to Steven Karsera, for a one-hundred-per-cent effort. Minutes before the interval, Russell Carr crashed over to extend the Withernsea lead to 10-0.

The second half was just as hard and uncompromising. Both packs worked tremendously hard to the bitter end. Withernsea increased their lead with a well-taken try by Maurice Elliott. Roos, however, were not finished and coach Fred Stuart decided to introduce Ron Symes into the attack. The result was that Roos dominated the scrums and started to look dangerous. Gradually Withernsea wilted under the constant barrage of Roos attacks, which led to a Steve West try and a Trevor Bailey conversion. Despite continued pressure from Roos, Withernsea added to their points with a penalty goal by Maurice Elliott and won 16-6. Man of the match for Roos: Steve Karsera.

# 9th May v Skirlaugh

Roos lost 42-2, the solitary goal being scored by Trevor Bailey. Steve Karsera was again Man of the Match. Despite the heavy scoreline, Roos were in no way disgraced. The team were obviously suffering from injuries and fatigue which affected their play immensely. However, Ron Symes, Trevor Bailey, Steve Karsera and Roy McCunnel produced excellent performances.

### Summary of the Season

In their first season Roos can be extremely proud of their achievements. The club has won six games and with a bit of luck it could have been ten. Lack of experience was obviously a major factor. New players have joined the club and the team generally should be more at home next season after tasting a year's hard rugby. Players to take the eye were; Trevor Bailey, David Staniforth, Graham Marshall, Steve Karsera, Ron Symes and Roy McCunnel. Fred Stuart, the coach, has done extremely well and

much credit must go to him for travelling from Hull twice a week.

The Committee have worked extremely hard throughout the year, with Trevor Uscroft making an outstanding contribution. The Club are deeply indebted to Pete and Sue Sedgwick for their assistance, especially in allowing the changing-room facilities to be sited in the Roos Arms car park. Both Committee and players also very much appreciate the excellent support there has been from the general public of Roos.
