### Roos Parish Council

The meeting of 10th October was chaired by Councillor G.E. Winter. All other councillors were present, except for Councillor Cook, who sent his apologies.

#### Minutes & Matters Arising

Roads. There had been no reply to the Clerk's letter to the Highways Department about roads and "the village green". He agreed to write again.

Plaque for Clerk. The Clerk was to obtain a plaque with wording based on Councillor Quarumby's draft.

Litter Bin. Councillor Quarumby agreed to fix the litter bin near the gate to the playing field.

#### Correspondence

Photographic Competition. Revised closing date, National Tree Week, 26 November - 4 December. A poster was to be displayed. It was agreed that planting in clumps was desirable. Councillor Grant observed that oaks grew well, beeches not so well; advice on favourable species would be helpful.

Bus Timetables. Copies for notice board and shops.

Local Government Boundary Commission. The report - "People and Places" - to be held by the Clerk.

#### Planning

Decisions of the Borough Council were reported. The following applications had been approved: Cherry Hill, South End Road (Double garage); 3- 5 Pilmar Lane (Rear extension); Plot 2, North of Elm Garth (Two-bedroomed bungalow).

Consent had been refused for the following:

Detached dwelling at North End (D.S. 47). The building was contrary to the Structure Plan and unrelated to previous buildings on the site.

North End Garage (Storage of scrap vehicles). The use was contrary to Structure Plan and considered harmful to open countryside. There might be a noise nuisance. It was considered that neither the reduction of the site area nor the fencing and landscaping would redeem the ill effects.

The Parish Council supported three new applications:

The Elms. Three-bedroomed detached house (Mrs M. Smith) within the walled garden.

Plot 4, South of Dove Lane Four-bedroomed house (on the development site with access from Rectory Road).

Old Rectory. Change of use from offices to residential accommodation.

The Parish Council did not support the following:

Kiln Lane, Tunstall. Mobile home (Mr L. Smith). There was inadequate detail and no agricultural use.

D.S. 215/216 North of Dove Lane (south-east of The Chestnuts). Landscaping proposals. Councillors were dissatisfied with the proposals and agreed to seek a site meeting with the Borough's Tree Officer. One problem was the steep bank that had been made on the south-east corner. The proposals included a hedge along the top of the bank. This would have the effect of a boundary excluding the steep sides of the bank and leaving a corner for which future owners would not feel responsible. The Council recommended that soil be removed from the bank to reduce its gradient. The hedge could then run down Dove Lane as far as the bridge and the boundary would then turn northwards along the line of the beck. It was deemed essential that responsibility for maintaining the boundary should be laid upon eventual purchasers in their deeds. Moreover, to be effective, the drain alongside Dove Lane must cure the seepage of water from the site on to the path; water should run to the beck and not across the footpath.

Reasons for Planning Refusals. In answer to a query from the Director of Development, it was agreed that in future the Parish Council would welcome stated reasons when planning applications were rejected.

North End. Councillor Winter reported that the Director of Development was to have discretion how to settle the problems over development between The Roost and Ivy House.

#### Any Other Business

Water on Road. It was agreed that a complaint about standing water near Ivy Cottage, Hilston, should be referred to the Highways Department.

The Rooster. Councillor Helliwell asked if the Parish Council would contribute to the costs of the newsletter in 1989 - £12.00 had been donated in 1988. No contribution was agreed. It was argued that, if there was little public interest in The Rooster, then it would be wrong to make a donation - but if the

current appeal had a good response then the Council might contribute too. Councillor Helliwell thought this illogical ; the Council would help only if their help was unnecessary. He had hoped for a token of support rather than a significant amount of cash.

### Playing Field Association

#### ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

At the meeting in The Roos Arms on 26th October the Treasurer, Mr Gordon Green, presented accounts showing a balance of £7,561.

The Chairman, Mr Stewart Wilson, reviewed the year's activities. In spite of a good deal of hard work and generosity, early hopes of amassing sufficient funds to qualify for grant-aid to erect the sports pavilion had not been fulfilled. The ambitious programme of events had not been uniformly successful. However, funds had been increased by £3,000 and that was a substantial achievement.

Mr Wilson referred to complaints that the Committee had not made sufficient headway. Until the pavilion was actually erected and in use such criticism might increase. It might be the reason why support for the Association appeared to be slackening. The Committee might need to develop new approaches. With a little extra thought and an ability to recover the initial support, he was confident that the Association could establish a pavilion to benefit the whole village.

### Committee Elections

Members directly elected to the Committee were unchanged ; Mrs Shirley Cooke, Mr Tony Grant, Mr Gordon Green, Mr Dudley Hulme, Mr Don Rowland, Mr Stewart Wilson, Mr Cyril Woodhouse, and Mrs Joyce Woodhouse. The following Committee Members nominated by local groups were confirmed ; Mr Brian Atkinson (Model Aircraft Flying Club), Mr Alan Bowden (Parish Council), Mr Pete Dearing (Cricket Club), Mr Ron Derbyshire (Football Club), Mrs Suzanne Keatings (Playgroup). Representatives were currently unconfirmed for the following ; the Memorial Institute Committee, Parent-Teacher Association, the Rugby Club, the Women's Institute, The Young Farmers.

### COMMITTEE MEETING

The AGM was followed by a Committee Meeting at which the following Officers were re-elected ; Chairman, Stewart Wilson; Vice-Chairman, Dudley Hulme; Secretary, Shirley Cooke; Treasurer, Gordon Green.

In view of a visit by Sports Council representatives, the Chairman undertook to proceed with a grant application, even though the required 25% of the estimated cost of erecting the pavilion had not yet been raised. If the application was successful, it was hoped that grants from other bodies would be forthcoming. Meanwhile, it was agreed to take steps to maintain in good condition the pavilion frame already donated by B.P.

It was agreed to obtain finely-crushed brick to complete the surfacing of the car park before winter so as to encourage motorists to use it and not spoil the field by parking on the grass. A children's swing would be erected as soon as a new seat had been obtained. A certificate had been received from Village Ventures 1988 in recognition of the work already done on the playing field.

The next Committee Meeting will be held at 8.30 p.m. on 23rd November at The Roos Arms.

### Football : Roos A

9th Oct. Roos 5, Old English Gentlemen 0  
After beating Premier League Lord Nelson the previous week, Roos were brimful of confidence for the visit of Old English Gentlemen, current joint leaders of Division 3. Roos took immediate command and rarely allowed the visitors a look-in. Old English were physically strong but much less skilful than Roos and allowed goals in at fairly regular intervals. Scorers were : Dave Hampton 2; Mike Clarkson 2; Dave Cowell.

#### 16th October. Golf Centre 2, Roos 2

Every team wants the distinction of ending Roos's long spell without defeat and Golf Centre were no exception. Though languishing in mid-table, they competed hard to prove that they would not be easy to beat. In spite of superior skills, Roos could not score. Then George Bilton's header from a corner found the back of the net, only for the referee to blow his whistle for half time before the ball crossed the line.



To add to this blow, Golf scored direct from the re-start. Their kick-off was tapped to a player who saw Pete Dearing off his line and curled a 45-yard shot over his head into the net. Dave Cowell equalised after more good build-up play but Golf went ahead again after complacent Roos defence allowed a cross to be brilliantly headed in by their centre-forward.

Thereafter, Roos put the home defence under tremendous pressure but were unable to finish. With the seconds ticking away, Sean Royce made another of his scintillating runs and laid the ball across for Nick Derbyshire who, keeping his head, delivered a perfect return pass for Sean to fire into the net. There was only time to take the kick-off before the final whistle. Roos will not come closer to defeat than this. Scorers : Dave Cowell, Sean Royce.

#### 23rd October. Roos 2, Elland 1

Without star players Geoff Newton and Sean Royce, Roos were bound to struggle against a strong Elland side, previously unbeaten with 2 wins and 2 draws. For most of the first period Roos were under great pressure but against superb defence Elland rarely created scoring chances. From the re-start, however, they remedied this. A big central defender climbed above the Roos defence from a corner and placed a superb header into the top corner of the net.

Elland then sat back a little, mistakenly allowing Roos's never-say-die spirit to take over. After a rare foray into the Elland half, Roos equalised. The superb Dave Hampton (who this season is playing better than ever) pounced on a loose ball in the penalty box to fire wide of the keeper.

While Elland continued to press without really creating anything, Roos stole the match with a freak goal. Mike Clarkson kicked what was intended to be a long far-post cross. His direction was slightly awry and it looked as if the keeper would easily collect the ball under his bar but he inexplicably let it sail through his hands into the net - much to the relief of the Roos side. At the close, Elland were suitably aggrieved at having let this result slip. Scorers : Dave Hampton, Mike Clarkson.

#### 30th October. George Munro Cup. Roos 1, Viking/Malet A 2.

For the second time Roos faced Premier League opposition in the Munro Cup, although this time the fixture was at home. With Sean Royce still absent through injury and Tony Hunt and Gary Thompson also injury victims on the Saturday, it was a slightly makeshift Roos side which took the field.

This only served to spur Roos on. For most of the first period they were on top, playing some excellent football to catch the Viking defence unawares. After a missed penalty when Dave Hampton's kick rebounded from the foot of the post, it was no surprise when Roos scored - from a long George Bilton throw-in which was headed on by both Jon Dearing and Dave Hampton for Nick Derbyshire to flick into the net. Showing why they are a Premier League side, Viking replied with some excellent football at pace but the Roos defence stood firm, holding out until half time.

For the third successive week, however, Roos conceded a goal through lack of concentration. A bad back-pass failed to

reach the keeper, allowing a Viking forward to latch on to the ball and, despite the attentions of two defenders, place his shot wide of Pete Dearing for the equaliser. Roos must learn that at this level concentration has to be 100% for the whole match.

Viking gained immense confidence from this goal and played some of their best football to score what proved to be the winner, another well-struck slot after fine build-up play. Although Roos kept pressing for an equaliser, the Viking defence proved too strong - the creative abilities of Sean Royce were much missed. Roos attacked to the end but without success, thus losing their first cup match for three seasons. To have remained unbeaten for so long is a remarkable achievement. Scorer : Nick Derbyshire.

Roos have shown themselves capable of competing well against Premier League teams but before we can bring top teams here we need better changing facilities, which are archaic and an embarrassment for the club. At the end of this season when the Playing Field Committee provide new changing and shower facilities, Roos clubs will be the envy of the area.

## A History of Roos - 5

In October Mr Wilbraham's early history of the de Ros family was summarised. Mr Wilbraham notes occurrences both of their name and of their arms. If you are interested in relics (especially the arms) of the far-flung family, this list of place-names may be useful. Except where otherwise stated, references are apparently to churches.

Aldbrough Church : north side of the Melsa monument.  
Beverley Minster : N.Transept. Effigy of a priest with the Ros Arms among others on his stole.  
Bubwith : north aisle.  
Burton Agnes : east window and north aisle.  
Butley Abbey, Suffolk : Gate.  
Crowthorpe : windows and font.  
Danby Castle : stones in walls  
Filkton(?); St Quintin chapel.  
Gilling Castle : fireplace of Great Chamber.  
Harewood House : private chapel.  
Helasley : mural paintings; also brass on floor.  
Kirk Deighton : See later.  
Kirkham Abbey : Gateway.  
Orston, Leicestershire, 1391.

In the chancel, a slab and recumbent figure with an ogee canopy recess with pinnacles. Lady Isabel de Ros. Arms of Ros & Albin.

Her second son, Sir Robert de Ros, founder of the Ros family in Hertfordshire, was Treasurer to the King.

Roos : barony window.

Selby Abbey.

Sutton : west end of Sayers

Tomb : one of five.

Thornton in Craven : Over east window, in old English characters : "When this church and quire were builded here Thomas Lord Ros was patron here. On whose soul God have mercy." Time : Edward IV.

West Tanfield : East window.  
Wensley : Buttress South Nave.  
York Minster : See later.

### Kirk Deighton

Mr Wilbraham visited the church at Kirk Deighton in 1941. The following is a summary of his notes.

(The de Ros arms are) Cut in stone over south door. The ROS and MANNERS families were patrons to the living.

In the north chancel is the tomb of Robert, with Arms, died 1476, and of Maria de Ros. Brian Ros, ordained priest 1492, was Rector in 1498. His brother, Thomas Roos of Ingmanthorpe, was buried there in 1503. Thomas aided Henry VIII in the Dissolution of the Monasteries. He had many

ancient monuments of the Albinis and the Rosses moved from the Priory Churches of Belvoir and Croxton to Bottesford.

In the chancel, west of the vestry door, are the remains of a mural arched tomb said to be of Lord Robert de Ros who, in the time of King John, lived at Ingmanthorpe Old Hall and was said to have enlarged the church. Edward Roos was Rector in 1512.

### York Minster

Nave north side 2nd and 3rd bays from west. Lady chapel and choir, south side, 6th bay (1st after transept).

Stained Glass. Window at the north end of the east transept, Lady between two knights (space) arms. JOHN, the eldest son of William the 7th Baron of Hamlake, the 8th Baron, with Margaret his wife, the daughter and heiress of Sir William Despencer. WILLIAM and THOMAS second and third sons of William the 7th Baron. ROBERT and RICHARD the fourth and fifth Barons.

(Mr Wilbraham adds the notes :) William the 7th Baron died at Belvoir and is there buried. John lived in Henry V's time. He

was slain at Baugé aged 23 and was succeeded by Thomas the 3rd son at the age of 14½. The family of Ros loved the Minster and were noble benefactors to the fabric. Their arms occur more frequently than any other in the spandrel of the nave and choir. The window was put in by the wife of John and was completed by 1423; by then she had married Wentworth.

Other Members of the de Ros Family  
(From Yorkshire Antiquarian Society sources)

Sir Robert de Roos, Knight, of Ingmanthorpe near Wetherby, died 1392, made bequests to Orders of Friars.

Alexander Roos, William Roos & Dame Alice of Roos, buried in Blackfriars Church, York. John de Roos was Bishop of Carlisle 1325 - 32.

Robert, brother of Brian, Rector of Goxhill, 1498.

Frazer John Roos, a friar of York, (was) the first undoubted English organ builder of whom there is any authentic account. He was employed in the Minster, being paid in 1457 36s.8d for improving and repairing the organ at the altar of the B.V.M. with one pair of bellows for the same, and in 1470 for making two pairs of bellows for the great organ and repairing it.
