Roos Parish Council

At the meeting on 13th March Councillors K.G.Grant, C.M.Jackson, and D.E.Winter were unable to attend and sent their apologies.

Roos VDS Association

The Village Design Association had written requesting payment of the £200 grant agreed some two years earlier.

After some discussion - during which one councillor said that the project was "a waste of public money" - all but one agreed that the grant had been promised and the project should be supported.

Proposed speed restrictions

The Council had been notified some time earlier of the proposed 30 mph and 40mph restrictions in the village. They welcomed the fact that public notices were being displayed and that the limits would soon be in place.

S.H.O.W.T.

At an earlier meeting it had been proposed to make a donation to the pressure group South Holderness Opposes Wind Turbines. An obstacle had been the possibility that it might be improper to make such a grant. Advice received from the Local Councils Association was that such a grant would be perfectly within the Council's prerogative.

There was no further discussion and no grant was agreed.

Village ponds

There was information from the East Riding that grants were available for projects to restore or construct village ponds. The topic was discuses briefly - and with a degree of levity. No proposal was made.

Planning

Amboseli, Burton Road

Application for outline consent for a detached dwelling. The Parish Council had previously opposed the application because the site was outside the village limit. The Eastern Area Planning Committee had postponed a decision because they were not persuaded that the pig unit on the site was viable. They would be prepared to reconsider the application if it was resubmitted within two months with convincing arguments as to viability of the unit.

Owstwick Grange, Owstwick

Outline application by Mr and Mrs Cowell for a detached dwelling. One councillor opposed the application as it was outside the village limit and no agricultural case had been put forward.

Councillors Quarmby and Cook argued that the proposed building was essential for the future of the family business on the site. Mrs Cowell was the daughter of the family and her husband was likely to take over management of the business. Local farmers depended on the service it offered and it provided local employment.

The Chairman insisted that this case had not been put in the application and therefore the Council had no option but to oppose. Other councillors were persuaded by the arguments in favour, observing that the Parish Council could itself advance the reasons put forward. It was agreed to support the application.

Accounts

In the Treasurer's absence the Chairman presented a report. There was just over £2,223 in the Parish Council's account.

It was agreed to pay the Clerk's recent expenses.

Insurance. The company recommended the Parish Council (as Trustees of the Memorial Institute) to increase the cover from £2 million to £5 million for an additional premium of £30 - a total of £147. This was agreed.

Any other business

Signs at bus stops

In answer to a question, the Clerk said that no reply had yet been received to the request to EYES to erect two signs.

Millennium memorial

At a previous meeting members had considered the Chairman's proposal to place a board to mark the millennium on the "village green" - the grassed corner opposite the old school. They envisaged a square brick base on a concrete foundation and filled with concrete which would be slotted to house a post for the board.

Councillor Quarmby suggested a number of alternative options, one of which was pursued: a structure of granite blocks with a suitable plaque and probably to be sited on the

verge outside the entrance to Roos School. Questions were raised as to ownership of the verge and the permission needed from Highways. But in principle this scheme appeared to have general support.

PUBLIC SESSION

Rev Philip Moats said that a structure to commemorate 2,000 years since Christ's birth should carry some indication of the fact. He suggested a star (the Bethlehem star) as a motif to symbolise the significance. Councillors concurred.

The questionnaire supplied with this newsletter is part of the consultation process, which is described in more detail on the front cover of the document.

By November the VDS Committee will have submitted a final version of the Roos Village Design Statement to the East Riding of Yorkshire Council. If the Council adopt the Statement, it will become supplementary planning guidance for any development proposed for Roos in the future.

Before then, village people will be able to examine a copy of the VDS at two stages:

- A first draft VDS for consultation and comment.
- A final draft incorporating comments on the first and offering an opportunity for minor changes and additions.

To have effective status the Roos VDS requires maximum collaboration from local people.

In addition, you are very welcome to attend meetings of the Committee. For the last month they have been held weekly in the Roos Arms on a Monday or Tuesday evening. Contact any committee member for the date of the next one.

Please note that the cost of printing the questionnaire has been met from VDS funds - not by The Rooster.

Paying for the Newsletter
