**SHINGLES VACCINATION**

A vaccine to prevent shingles, a common, painful skin disease is available on the NHS to certain people in their 70s. The shingles vaccine is given as a single injection into the upper arm. Unlike the flu jab, you'll only need to have the vaccination once and you can have it at any time of the year.

Shingles can be very painful and uncomfortable. Some people are left with pain lasting for years after the initial rash has healed. The shingles vaccine is routinely available to people aged 70 and 78. Please ask at reception to see if you are currently eligible to receive this vaccination.

## Roos Parish Council Report: March 2016

Parish Council Minutes are published in full on Parish Notice Boards and on the parish website – roosparish.info

The following is a 'snapshot' of some of the issues considered.

Councillor election Recently elected Councillor Devanney was welcomed to the meeting.

Pedestrian Crossing. The Council's request for a pedestrian crossing on Main Street has been evaluated by ERYC traffic engineers who had conducted a survey at peak morning and evening times. The outcome of their report states "pedestrian crossing movements are relatively light and traffic flows of the level recorded allow for acceptable gaps in the traffic for pedestrians to cross without too much difficulty". The ERYC are therefore unable to provide a pedestrian crossing as requested.

Speeding vehicles. Traffic enforcement officers continue to monitor the situation.

Police Report. Criminal damage occurred on 14<sup>th</sup> and 16<sup>th</sup> February, both at Sand le Mere

Planning. Application 16/00261. Installation of solar panels at All Saints' Church, Roos. No objection.

It was noted that Council will be consulted on:

Application 16/00464/PLF | Erection of an agricultural building for free range egg production with associated feed bins, hard-standings and access track | Land East Of Roos Road, Halsham.

Treasurer's report

The Treasurer sought and received approval for payment of expenses relating to work undertaken on the Parish Paths, Councillor Elections, and, renovations of the walls at The Pinfold.

Any other business.

It was reported that:

a section of the footpath in Hinch Garth is deteriorating and could become hazardous. It was resolved to report the matter to the ERYC recommending that remedial work be undertaken.

a manhole drain/cover in Hodgson Lane is sinking. Again, it was resolved to report the matter to both the ERYC and Yorkshire Water for remedial work.

Bushes and hedges in Tunstall had now been trimmed.

A question was asked about 'rights of public access' to private land off Rectory Road and whether 'rights' would result from long standing public usage. Members commented upon the legal intricacies involved and the necessary evidence required, quoting the recent example of re-establishing a parish path leading to Burton Pidsea.

An enquiry about payment for work undertaken to remove a potential blockage of Roos Beck was raised. It was reported that responsibility currently rested with the ERYC. It was noted that there were formal ERYC procedures in place to deal with such instances which might lead to an emergency situation arising. It is understood that the ERYC were compiling a register of all such watercourses together with a schedule for their periodic inspection.
